1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Bir Bikram Memorial College has started its journey as government institution on 19th August, 1969 as Bir Bikram Evening College with more than 300 male students in the premises of Maharaja Bir Bikram College, affiliated to Calcutta University. The college basically catered to the needs of those students who were not in a position to prosecute their studies in the existing day colleges of the state due to multiple reasons.

On 26th December, 2002, the college started a new journey shifting its establishment to a **new location at College Tilla** and was renamed as **BirBikram Memorial College**. At this juncture, the college was converted into a co-educational day college to fulfil the need of the hour, offering Bachelor's degree in Honours and Pass categories in Science, Arts and Commerce streams.

From a few hundred in the initial years now the total strength has risen to nearly 4000 and along with this the number of subjects being offered has also increased. In due course new subjects were added along with the introduction of Honours Course in most of the subjects and Physical Science is the latest addition. The College harbours exclusive pride in having Defense and Strategic Studies, an Elective optional for those studying Arts Major/ General Course.

Vision

The vision of the institution is to become a model institution rooted in traditional values with global perspective while competently serving to the academic necessity of Tripura. The ultimate aim is inclusive education, to inculcate highest human values and professionalism among its students so that they become intellectually competent, morally upright and sensitive to the needs of the society in particular and the humanity as a whole.

The College aims to be a leader in consolidating teaching and learning, in extension of knowledge base through research and scholarship and in endorsement/creation of leadership in service and other related fields beneficial for the Mankind. It also cherishes the vision of equipping the students, the future citizens, to cope with the socio-cultural milieu in a fast changing and complex society where every local issue or sphere of life is gaining global significance.

Mission

The mission of Bir Bikram Memorial College is to deepen and extend knowledge about the formation and utilization of human capabilities. The institution tirelessly strives to function with the following missions-

- impart liberal education
- o imbibe moral, spiritual values
- Sensitize students about Environment-friendly values
- o produce intellectually sound, morally upright, socially concerned men and women

- o prepare young people to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world,
- equip the students to take their rightful place in society in this twenty first century
- provide efficient and pragmatic training according to the changing demands of the present century.

The vision and mission of the institution are perfectly tuned to the objectives of the higher education policies in India. The students are taken to learning both in and outside the classroom and thus are motivated to be acquainted with the rural society, the nature as well as the moral foundations of the nation.

Socially and economically backward sections of the students are provided academic, cultural and financial support with a view to promote their position in the society. Free studentship, scholarships, library and Book Bank facilities, counselling, tutorial classes and many such programmes are provided to the students.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The college caters to a large number of students (3835) in the district belonging to all caste and creed hailing inclusive education policy.
- The college has an adequate area of 9.29 acres.
- The college has one Academic building which has six floors and houses the Staff room, Library,27 classrooms, 3 Laboratories and all the Departments and 1 Administrative Building. The college has one well furnished canteen.
- The faculty strength is 53 among which there are 19 Associate Professors, 15 Assistant Professors and 19 Post Graduate Teachers .To cater to the increase in students' strength 23 Guest teachers are also engaged.
- Out of 18 subjects the college offers Honours Courses in 11 subjects.
- The College has campus-LAN and Wi-Fi connectivity (limited area) functioning for round the clock and internet facility available of 10Mbps broadband (under NMEICT project) and one 512 Kbps WI-max internet connectivity.

• The central horary has customized Library management software.
• The College has four (05) smart classrooms equipped with projectors and PA systems.
 The College offers quality education with its dedicated teachers. Faculty members are involved in research activities.
• Tutorial classes/ remedial teaching help the slow learners to mitigate their fear of pursuinghigher education.
• Extension activities help the students to become active social workers.
Institutional Weakness
 The average student teacher ratio is 1:57, most of the departments are facing a shortage of faculty members and every yearnew guest faculty has to be engaged.
• Non-availability of technical staff (non-teaching) for all Science and Computer Science departments.
• Shortage of trained staff in the Central Library affects the maintenance of library related procedures.
• Smart-classrooms are yetto be equipped with digital boards for more effective interactive classes.
 College requires a largeAuditorium for organizing any programmes, viz., Seminars, student functions etc.
College doesn't have a playground or any adequate modern sports equipment.

• Shortage of teaching as well as non-teaching staff quarters.
• The students' Common Rooms are demolished, new ones are yet to be built. No recreational facilities are available.
Departments are not equipped with additional libraries ,books for ready-reference during college hours.
• Most of the students comefrom regional medium schools, communication skills is not up to the mark.
Institutional Opportunity
 The large student intake may be potentially channelized if they get the facilities for honing their talents and skills Adequate number of teachers can steer the students to get the actual academic benefit.
• If number of efficient ministerial staff is increased the official work will run smoothly which will ultimately help the college academic environment.
 If skilled Laboratory Assistants are employed in the college, the science students will be benefited in their practical courses.
• Enhancement of research activities.
Strategic priorities and initiatives to enhance faculty excellence.
Institutional Challenge

• The indecisiveness of the students regarding their future career capabilities. The competitive ability may decline if students do not get proper facility and proper attention to hone their employability skills.

- The employability ratio of graduate students.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

At present the higher education scenario is undergoing a sea-change and this institution aims at offering quality education by strengthening the process of teaching-learning to enable the students to access knowledge and become employable. The faculty members are invited by the University at meetings/workshops of curricula development to formulate the action plan. The Academic committee comprising of senior teachers take the responsibility of designing academic calendar, preparation of master routine, departmental routine and monitoring the day-to-day academic activities. The faculty members utilize ICT mode of teaching/using elearning resources for effective lecture sessions. Departmental meetings are held every month to discuss distribution of topics, number of classes required and estimate the tentative dates to complete assigned Unit and if required take extra classes.

The Bir Bikram Memorial College offers a value based education at Undergraduate level. Other than the Humanities and Commerce streams 04 new subjects (Physical Science)were introduced in 2012, Honours and General programs were introduced in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics; also Kokborok (General.) Computer Application has been introduced as a compulsory Foundation paper in the fourth semester for all students.

There is no separate placement cell in the college, the faculties of different departments regularly take initiatives for skill development of the students so that the student with an eye to make them more employable. Besides, to develop the required skills, brain storming sessions are held for the faculty members to design the tools in the areas of communicative English, use of computers etc.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The faculty members of the College have an inclination towards research work in their respective subjects and

are engaged in individual research work for UGC Minor and Major Research Projects and for their Ph.D. programmes. Recently, 7 minor research projects (UGC) were sanctioned to the college. In addition to it, eight minor research project proposals were submitted to the UGC. The College has an active research committee to monitor and address the issues of research. The committee motivates faculty members to get involved in R&D activities and to organize State/National/International-level seminars. The committee also induces the faculty members to participate in seminars and workshops organized by other institutes/research organizations. Faculty members are actively participating in seminars/workshops/conferences in the state and outside too and have also published their research works. Few intra-college level seminar/invited talks have been organized during last five years. Most of the Assistant Professors have completed their Orientation/Refresher Programmes from different Academic Staff Colleges. The College has come up with various efforts to develop scientific temper and aptitude among students . There is a Science Forum financed by Tripura State Council for Science and Technology which conducts college level seminars, observing National Science Day, Ozone Layer Day, Earth day etc., invited lectures are also organized by the forum for the benefit of the students.. Two students have participated in the Project Presentations and have won the 1st position in 2016 for their project namely "Energy Audit of Bir Bikram Memorial College".

Student Support and Progression

College publishes its Prospectus clearly stating the rules and regulations of admissions in all the classes. The information disseminated to students through the Annual Prospectus mainly comprise of relevant information for admission such as academic programmes/ courses offered and intake capacity, available subject combinations and degrees, restriction to the choice of subject combinations, admission criteria and fee structure for various programmes, medium of instruction, attendance instruction, dress code etc. The College channelizes financial aid to the economically and socially backward students through post matric scholarship provided by Government of India and Government of Tripura. There are also category specific stipends, LIG stipends, Book grants etc which are disbursed through DBT schemes to merit-cum-means students. The NSS unit of the college also organizes health awareness generating programmes and health checking-up programmes. There is one health centre in the college premises but no health insurance provision for students. In case of medical emergencies, the students are taken to the nearby Hospital if the doctor refers. The Bir Bikram Memorial College also publishes its magazine annually as well as wall magazines quarterly "Pratichi" with significant contributions from the students. The College has a career counselling cell but no placement unit. The faculty members provide academic and personal counselling to the students regarding choice of subjects during admission. Important advice and suggestions are imparted by teachers to the students in cases of low attendance, time-table management & learning techniques and also how to improve poor marks in the sessional tests and also final examinations.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The college follows the syllabi and curriculum as formulated by the Tripura/ MBB University for all the semesters. as it does not have academic autonomy. The Government's support is in the form of providing sufficient fund for implementing modern techniques of teaching and learning. ICT enabled teaching environment is accessible for overall development of the teaching-learning practices in the institution. Prospectus containing annual plan of the curricula is distributed among the students at the time of admission and the entire Semester planning is conveyed to the students during the Induction programme. Planning and monitoring of the whole process is done by the Teachers' Council, IQAC and college administration..Tutorial classes are taken to supplement regular class and also to diffident category of students.

Occasionally arrangements are made to invite experts in related fields for Lectures and presentations to equip the students about the latest research etc.

Continuous evaluation method and corrective measures are adopted throughout the academic session. Two sessional examinations and one viva voce is taken which adds up to 20% Of the total marks of the Final examination.

Parents-teachers' meet is organized twice, i.e., one at the beginning and one at the end of the session to discuss difficulties faced and improvements needed.

Use of advanced teaching learning methods, smart classes, and well equipped laboratories are made available to the teachers and learners.

Each department conducts monthly meetings to discuss the issues relevant to curriculum delivery and communicate the report to the academic cell if required.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The Policy of creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitates effective teaching and learning is framed according to the strength of faculty, office staff and students. Resolutions towards infrastructural development are usually made on the basis of interaction of the Academic, Development and UGC committees with the Principal and different stakeholders. The college has an adequate area 9.29 acres but was in need of separate Administrative Building, Science Departments/Laboratories, Classrooms, Auditorium, Library Hall etc., which was partially implemented through a perspective plan, submitted to Department and during 2008-2016 the Administrative building was completed by the Housing Construction Board, Government of Tripura under the NLCPR Scheme. The College is endowed with excellent physical infrastructural facilities e.g., self-contained classrooms, five smart class rooms, well-equipped laboratories, separate departments and a canteen to support the teaching-learning process, it has two Blocks, Academic and the Administrative, one playground, and a well-furnished canteen. However the Common Rooms for the students are under construction.

The Central Library has adequate space, and is also well stocked with a large number of books and journals, Internet, and other support facilities. All the departments, library, administrative block have ICT enabled facilities with BSNL broadband internet connection and Wi-Fi connectivity. The College has constant drinking water supply for students, teaching and non-teaching staff. The college also has ramp, washroom and lift facilities for differently-abled students, to ensure that they do not have any difficulty while attending the classes.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The college runs under the aegis of Department of Higher Education, Government of Tripura and the allocation of funds for general and infrastructure development, recruitment of teaching staff and non-teaching staff, fund for welfare schemes are managed by the Department. The Principal is the institutional Head, ex-officio President of the Teachers' Council of the college and also supervises the administrative section comprising of the Establishment, Accounts, Academic, Cash and Store Sections to manage the administrative affairs of the college. The academic affairs are handled by the academic departments, the Heads of the Departments uphold

a healthy interaction with their colleagues which helps in designing and implementation of the plans and policies. The College has a formally stated policy for the maintenance of quality which aims at excellence in academic pursuits as also stresses upon inclusive education. The college administration has opted for 'self-appraisal system' to evaluate the performance of the faculty. The Reports are evaluated confidentially by the Principal and sent to the Directorate of Higher Education, Government of Tripura for approval. The College also appraises the performance of its non-teaching staff at the time of promotion recommended by the Principal and approval by the DHE. Participatory management is encouraged and there is an attempt to groom leadership in various stages. An efficient administration is always helpful hence the Internal Quality Accreditation Cell (IQAC) ensures quality enhancement and RUSA scheme, as well as the UGC sanctions help the institution in maintenance and upgradation of the campus.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The college is nearing its golden jubilee year as a seat of higher learning. Assuring inclusive education to the students-community of the state enables it to cater to the needs of the student community living in and around the periphery of the capital resulting in the steady growth of the student strength. A few innovations having a positive impact on the functioning of the College are:

- The shift of the institution to a permanent building
- Change in the timings of the working of the college
- Decision to admit the girl students since 2000.
- Constructing a separate Academic Building
- Making special efforts to inculcate environmental awareness amongst its students. To develop ecological consciousness amongst students, a wide range of activities is carried out
- Undertaking environmental awareness projects, Organizing seminars to create and maintain eco-friendly environment, Campaigns to protect the green environment and film screenings, Green Audit, Waste Management initiative.
- The number of classrooms with larger space has been increased to accommodate more students.
- Utilising IT in admission, teaching and learning processes., examinations
- The students are also involved in extension activities to sensitize them about their surroundings enabling them to cultivate a fellow-feeling, essential for their future.
- Students' excellence in diverse fields are encouraged, endorsed and recognised throughout the year.

The college follows the syllabi and curriculum as formulated by the Tripura/ MBB University for all the semesters and it does not have academic autonomy. The curriculum prepared by the University which the college is affiliated to, is well transacted to the students after serious preparation by the faculty members. Different FIPs are attended by the faculty members to get themselves familiar with the latest trends of the curriculum. ICT enabled teaching environment is accessible for overall development of the teaching-learning practices in the institution they gather from the college specifically from feedback received from faculty, as well as students. For result oriented operationalisation of the crriculum, and for effective implementation of the curriculum the following steps are undertaken by the institution:

- Tutorial classes are taken to supplement regular class and also the slow learners.
- Continuous evaluation method and corrective measures are adopted throughout the academic session.
- Parents-teachers' meet is organized twice, i.e., one at the beginning and one at the end of the session. Parents are briefed about thei ward's performance.
- In case of implementation of new or modified syllabi respective departments are asked to give requisition for new books and other teaching materials.
- Each department conducts monthly meetings throughout the year to discuss the issues relevant to curriculum delivery and communicate the report to the academic cell if required.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students, after admission and organises special programs for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

• At the beginning of the session the faculty members conduct individual interactive session with students, if required, to assess the same. True, there is no such mechanism to assess the learning levels of the students except the marks obtained by them in their last public examination. The Government rules too have hardly any provision to arrange any such tests for the students before their admission. But after the admission, the college has periodical tests to assess the progress of the students – thanks to the semester system introduced by the University. After every six months there is an end term examination for the students. And within this period, the students have to face two internal assessments which help the teachers to identify the progress of the students in respective subjects as well as identify the advance level learners and slow learners. Though it is not feasible always to give individual attention towards the slow learners because of the huge class-load and for the disproportionate student-teacher ratio, the teachers try to gear up the slow learners by encouraging them, providing them necessary notes and books etc. so that they can cope up with others in their academic activities.

However, the College identifies advanced learners by means of the database of the students. The internal tests and the model exams, which are a part of continuous internal assessment, help in evaluating the calibre of the students.

- The methods used by various departments for categorizing the students include group discussions whereby the analytical skills and group dynamics of the students can be evaluated, and seminars, where the students' presentation skills can be assessed.
- Various strategies and mechanisms for student centric learning are adopted by the teachers to cater
 to the diverse needs of students in the classroom. In most departments, the departmental teachers
 prepare Teaching Plan before every academic session which is discussed in the Departmental
 meeting and verified by the departmental head before implementation. The teaching plan includes

the following aspects:

- Structure of session and schedule of the activities
- Adopting best teaching and learning methods to achieve learning outcomes.
- List of contents and key topics.
- Learning resources to be given to the students.
- Arranging quizzes, debates on topics taken from the texts. Students are asked to frame questions for quizzes. They participate in debates for which the subjects are chosen from the texts itself. Smart classroom are utilised for audio visual teaching. Students are more interactive when they enjoy the audio/video format of texts or are impressed with a lecture from a renowned scholar of the country. The students of Science and Commerce stream are dedicated to problem solving. The students of Social science and Literature also solve problems but the structure of the problem and their approach is different.

Programmes for Advanced Learners:

- The writing skills of students are developed by conducting different writing competition.
- Assignments, paper presentations, model classes by students, quiz competitions, group discussions and debates are other strategies adopted for providing additional input to advanced learners.
- Advanced learners are encouraged to undergo coaching for competitive examinations.
- They involve themselves in diverse club activities
- They are encouraged to participate in seminars, quiz competitions, debates, workshops etc. outside the College as well.

- Seminar halls and many class-rooms are equipped with computers and LCDs for multimedia projection.
- The computer lab of the college is equipped with internet enabled computer system.
- Each department has a departmental staff-room with desktop and internet facility.
- The Institution has a well equipped e-library with N-List facility.
- 10 MBPS Connection has been provided to the college, which is accessible to the staff and students.
- Public address system is available.
- Reprographic facility is available.

All these facilities are added advantages for the teacher to bring in innovation in teaching- learning process.

Students get opportunities to showcase their critical thinking and creativity in the following ways:

- College Magazine enables young writers to explore their creativity.
- In addition, the opportunities are provided for the following.
- Seminars and power point presentation by students.
- Participation in various competitions namely, quiz, debate and drama.

- Promoting activities of the College Students' Council and appreciating their new initiatives.
- Involving students in community work through NSS and encouraging them to conduct blood donation camps.
- Training and motivating the students to participate in inter college competitions to showcase their creative side.
- Facilitating mechanisms like career and counselling cell, grievance redressal cell and welfare measures to support students.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Reforms in Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level

Response:

As an affiliated institution of Tripura University, this college follows continuous assessment pattern as prescribed by the University for all programmes. Twenty percent of the total marks are set apart for continuous assessment in all programs. Of this twenty percent of the marks, eight percent is for two sessional examinations and the remaining four percent is earmarked for seminar, assignment, and individual performance of the student in the class. Two sessional examinations are conducted circulating notices at the beginning of every semester and one of these internal assessment is done at the mid of the semester and the other prior to the semester-end examination. Besides this type of evaluation, some students are sometimes asked to explain some problems in the classroom to develop their confidence as well as reach the students-community through these students. It is always a good practice to reach the backbenchers through their peers. Tutorials are also arranged for the backward students.

Students are allowed to see their evaluated scripts and discussion between the teacher and the students take place to clear the doubts, if any, of the students. Further the students are shown their weaknesses and suggestions are also given how to overcome those flaws. Some reforms we are going to introduce very soon are as follows:-

- 1. Arranging classes using audio-visual mode and asking for feedback from the students
- 2. Asking questions at the end of every class where the question pattern will be MCQ.
- 3. Arranging quizzes for the students in the class.
- 4. Students of literature may be encouraged to act or summarise what they are taught in the classroom.
- 5. Arranging a mock interview on the topics discussed every weekend with the departmental colleagues for the students.
- 6. Allowing the students to evaluate other's scripts. To find mistakes in other's script needs good command over the subject concerned. We should remember what Francis Bacon said in this regard in his famous essay 'Of Studies' and act accordingly.

These reforms in the internal assessment may encourage the weak students to participate in the teaching —learning process and develop their performance level in their Semester-end examinations.

2.5.2 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and variety

Response:

The evaluation process followed by the college is highly transparent. In case of internal written examinations, the answer papers after due evaluation are shown to the students. The students are allowed to

discuss regarding the evaluated scripts if required. The same method is also followed in case of seminar, assignment etc. After completion of the evaluation process, marks awarded by the students is published on the notice board for their verification. There is an effective and transparent mechanism toredress their grievances in respect of internal evaluation. The answer scripts are re-evaluated by the HoD in case any question of under-marking or over marking is raised by the concerned student.

As the present system of internal system is to conduct written examination following the guidelines of the University, there is very little chance of manipulation. As students can see other's answer scripts, there is hardly any chance of favouritism. In case oral presentation, there is scarcely any chance as the oral presentation is open before all other students and teachers of the department. Even viva voce is taken by a board of examiners constituted with the teachers of the department. Besides these, the college arranges department wise group discussion, assignments, seminars, presentations, class tests etc.to maintain transparency in the internal examination system.

The projects prepared by the students of Sixth Semester too are properly evaluated. The students need to present their findings in front of other teachers and the students of the department. They have to defend their findings and answer to the queries made by the teachers and students alike. On getting satisfactory answers, marks are awarded by the board.

2.5.3 Mechanism to deal with examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient

Response:

Regarding grievances with reference to evaluation, the student can approach the respective head of the departments immediately after the marks are exhibited on the notice board. The internal marks awarded by the departments are scrutinized firstly by the HoD concerned and then by the faculty members of the college before forwarding the same to the University. In case of internal examination, the candidates are allowed to carefully go through their evaluated answer scripts first. If they find any case of under marking or correct answer with no marks awarded, they are allowed to approach the HoD for further steps to reassess the script. The HoD takes steps immediate action to redress the grievance of the candidate concerned.

In respect of grievances regarding external that is, University examination, the examination cell of the University has its own system of scrutiny/review of the answer scripts. The University offers opportunity to the students to get their answer scripts re-evaluated through scrutiny or review as the case may be within a stipulated time. The students are allowed to see the evaluated answer scripts if they apply through RTI. At present, the University has no provision for review of the answer scripts of a candidate.

2.5.4 The institution adheres to the academic calendar for the conduct of CIE

Response:

A central class-wise timetable is prepared for the next academic year by the Routine Management Committee towards the end of every academic year and distributed in advance to all the departments. This

includes tentative dates and programme schedule for internal assessment. In fact, the University itself send to every affiliating college a guideline when the first internal assessment should be conducted and when the college should go for second internal assessment. As regards, viva-voce, the college as well as the University gives free hand to set the schedule of such viva voce. The departmental routine for theory classes and practical sessions is finalized by the head of the respective department and is made available to the faculty members at the beginning of the term. By the middle of every semester, the college is advised by the University to necessary steps so that they can take the first internal assessment. Generally,in case of even-Semester, the first internal assessment is conducted by the first week of September and the second one in early November. For odd Semester, the first internal assessment is held by the first week of March while the second assessment is to be held by the first week of May every year.

Besides this, the department arranges internal tests in the form of tutorials to keep on checking the performance of the student.

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes for all programs offered by the Institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students

Response:

The Program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes for all programs offered by the institution are clearly displayed/communicated to the stakeholders concerned. Dates of Internal assessment are communicated to the teachers and the students through notifications hung in the notice board. After the evaluation is over, the teachers allow the students to go through the assessed scripts. When they are satisfied with their evaluation, the mark slips are pasted on the notice board. The Semester —end exams are conducted by the university. The dates of such examinations are notified by the University in their website well ahead of the exams. When the results are published, the same is given in the University websites. The result sheet, when received from the university, is displayed in the Notice Board. The original mark-sheets in print form and the final certificate are sent to the institution and distributed through Academic Section of the same after keeping requisite records. The results of tutorials are informed to the candidates personally.

2.6.2 Attainment of program outcomes, program specific outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution

Response:

A large number of students take admission in our college every year and this being a Govt. college, the college cannot refuse admission to the intending students. The teachers of our college have an objective to reach the multiple intelligence within the classroom. Some students are there who take less interest in the traditional course. Their cases are taken care of separately. As a result, teachers can make sure that they reach every student as far as practicable.

The impact is positive. There are many students in our college who took admission having the pass marks only but they passed the BA/BSc./BCom program scoring good marks in their final exams.

The students of Science department are comparatively less. So they get personal care. Their performance is better in the college. Plus the practical component attracts them more.

The teachers of BA program have comparatively a large number of students. The diversity of intelligence is also found in this program. There are good singers, players, painters, actors etc. among them. So the teachers encourage them to perform better in these areas. Along with their preferred area of interest, they are also advised to give some time for their studies. It yields positive results in most cases.

The teachers of BCom. Program have less number of students. The teachers arrange workshops on current economic issues like GST etc. There is a MoUwith the Institute of Company Secretaries of India. So the motivational programmes inspire the students to take interest in their regular programs. And the program outcome is satisfactory with a good number of students passing from this institution.

Course oriented outcome is varied. Students of literature department and Social science department have interest in multiple areas. So the teachers take special care to nurture these areas of interest of the students and motivate them to take interest also in the university curriculum. The performance of the students are analysed on regular basis enabling the system to take corrective measures as and when necessary. A good number is found dedicated to their course oriented activities. The students feedback system provides the achievments of learning outcomes.

Over the years the institution has been maintaining the tradition of community services among the students for developing them as good citizen.

- A neighbouring slum at Aralia has been adopted by the NSS Units of the college.
- After the adoption of this area, the NSS Units of the College have bonded with the villagers and have given their best to uplift them socially as well as educationally.
- The NSS unit of the College has conducted community health and hygiene awareness programme in the adopted village. The purpose of the programmes is to make people aware of different health and hygienic aspects of day- to- day activities with special focus on the children of that area. The aim is to inculcate change of life-style through low-cost nutrition and hygiene awareness among the slum dwellers which will ultimately help to build a healthy society. The students who participated in these programme have experienced immense joy and satisfaction over the self less service they rendered for the benefit of the local community.
- The College never fails to raise funds to help the victims of natural calamities whenever such eventuality occurs.
- The College always organizes different extension activities in and outside the campus throughout the year to engage the students in different community oriented activities to develop a sense of social responsibility, service orientation and holistic development of the students. Faculty members have conducted socio-economic study of surrounding villages, diet surveys and cleanlinessawareness classes, lectures. The achievement and contribution of the students towards community development is documented by the NSS Programme Officer Under the scheme of location specific curriculum the College has organized various extension activities like medical camps in villages, health awareness rallies, blood donation camps based on specific needs of different communities as well as different localities within jurisdiction under the fund of UGC 11th five year plan. The students take an active part in these programmes and learn the problems of their surrounding and develop social responsibilities.
- Community Orientation activities are reflected through Blood Donation Camps, Camps for awareness of Hepatitis B, AIDS Awareness Programme, Awareness Programme on 'Anti-Dowry and Women's Right and Awareness Programme on 'Self Defence and Human Rights. Such activities help the student to get involved in the social services and expose them to real life experiences so necessary to learn. These also help them to enhance their self-esteem and develop their personality and work on their leadership skills.

The Council members also take the responsibility in finding out the difficulties faced by the students in matters of admission, examination, facilities etc and matters are solved by their active participation

The only source of funding of the Council is the annual subscription received at the time of admission as a part of the Annual admission fees which is spent for its day-to- day activities.
